WORK & IMPACT IN YOUR STATE

- In 2024, the NCJFCJ fulfilled three requests for technical assistance in **Utah**.
- In 2024, the NCJFCJ trained 37 judges, judicial officers, attorneys, and other juvenile and family court-related professionals working to protect **Utah's** children, families, and victims in our communities.
- The **Salt Lake City** Mentor Child Abuse and Neglect Model Court is recognized for its efforts to improve outcomes for abused and neglected children, juvenile offenders, and their families.
- Judicial system professionals from **Utah** participated in the Children and Youth and Engaging Men and Boys Program New Grantee Orientation hosted by the NCJFCJ's Technical Assistance to Technical Assistance Provider's (TA2TA) Resource Center and the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW).
- The NCJFCJ's Judicial Education Development Initiative on Domestic Violence (JEDI-DV) provided virtual education for the **Utah** Administrative Office of the Courts on protection orders and full faith and credit in cases involving domestic violence.
- Judges and justice system professionals from **Utah** received specialized child welfare, domestic violence, and juvenile justice training on current and cutting-edge topics and research during the NCJFCJ's Annual Conference and National Conference on Juvenile Justice.
- The state of **Utah** contributes juvenile court data to the National Juvenile Court Data Archive, funded by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). This national project of the NCJFCJ provides detailed and accurate information on the activities of the nation's juvenile courts to juvenile justice professionals, policy makers, researchers, and the public.
- The landscape of juvenile justice in **Utah** is detailed through the Juvenile Justice Geography, Policy, Practice, and Statistics website (JJGPS.org), a project of the NCJFCJ's research division, the National Center for Juvenile Justice (NCJJ). JJGPS is an online resource that tracks juvenile justice reform in each state, allowing for comparisons within and across states.
- The NCJFCJ has 45 Judicial and Associate Members in **Utah**.
- **Judge Angela F. Fonnesbeck** of **Logan** is a NCJFCJ Board Director. **Judge Sharon P. McCully (Ret.)** of **Salt Lake City** is a NCJFCJ Past President.

National Impact

In 2024, the NCJFCJ's work impacted approximately **4 million** families across the nation. Our publications amassed over **94,000** views, the team fulfilled over **150** requests for technical assistance, and trained over **15,000** judges, judicial officers, attorneys, and other juvenile and family-court related professionals across the nation.
