Make Security a Priority

- Security comes from the top down
- Create a Security Committee

Goal: The least paid court staff member should feel as secure as the judge.

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Administrative Order No. 2019-1 **Establishment of Court Security Committees** Therefore, it is ordered that each chief judge or, in any facility with multiple chief judges, one chief judge as designated by consensus of the chief judges, establish a standing courthouse security committee to be chaired by the chief judge or his/her designee. Court Security: Establish a Permanent Security Committee Committee should include representatives from (but not limited to): • Judge(s) other than the chief • Local law enforcement • Court security personnel • Court administration • Facilities management Clerk's office • Emergency management Other offices located in the facilities • Funding unit representatives Prosecutor's offices • Court employees' union, association, or other employee · Local bar representatives City attorney • Other important internal and · Sheriff's office external stakeholders **Court Security** • Security Improvement Plan • The Security Committee shall: • Develop and promote security policies and procedures regarding court security and emergency management: • Establish goals and objectives specific to improving physical security, emergency preparedness, and employee training: • Review all courthouse security incidents and take appropriate corrective measures to mitigate and/or eliminate security vulnerabilities to prevent future reoccurrences.

Court Security Security Improvement Plan The **Security Committee** should conduct a **risk** assessment to determine: What personnel, offices, and functions need to be protected What are they to be protected against Could be formulated as a five-year plan for the ultimate security goal Allows you to take incremental steps to achieve that goal **Court Security Develop & Implement a Security Manual** • A physical security plan • Routine security operations • Special operations plans Emergency procedures • A response plan Lockdown plans • Essential services contingency plan a/k/a Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) **Court Security Develop & Implement a Security Manual** (continued) • Backup and recovery plan for court records Protocol to assist emergency responders • Incident reporting procedures • Mail handling procedures • Threatening or inappropriate correspondence • Court security officer qualifications & duties · High risk trial plan

Threats – is a statement of an intention to inflict pain, injury, damage, or other hostile action on someone (court employee or court attendee) or an institution (court building) in retribution for something done or not done in the future. • Incident – is an action or communication that causes or threatens to cause personal injury, property damage, or disrupts courthouse proceedings.

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Court Security	
Create a Single Point of Entry	
Post signs directing people to the single entrance	
One main entrance and exit Secure <u>all</u> other entrance/exit doors	
Secure the Courthouse	
Everyone (including employees) entering the court should pass through a single point for observation and screening	
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Administrative Order 2001-1	
 No weapons are allowed in the (courthouse, courtroom, office, or space used for official court business or by judicial employees). This prohibition 	
does not apply to court security personnel or to uniformed or otherwise properly identified law enforcement officers in the performance of their	
official duties. The chief judge may authorize additional exceptions in extraordinary circumstances.	
extraorumary circumstances.	
 All persons and their belongings (unless specifically excepted) and all parcels are subject to screening by (sheriff's deputies, court officers, 	
security personnel) for the purpose of preventing weapons and other	
prohibited or restricted items from entering the facility.	
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Administrative Order 2001-1	
If at any time there is an articulable and reasonable suspicion that a	
weapon may be found, a person or object is subject to search. The search shall be no more intrusive than necessary to protect against the dangers	
presented.	
Notice shall be posted that "No weapons are permitted in this (courthouse,	
courtroom, office, or space used for official court business or by judicial employees). All persons and parcels are subject to a search for weapons	
and other prohibited or restricted items as a condition of entry. Persons in violation of this order may be held in contempt of court."	
Persons in violation of this order may be held in contempt of court.	

Screening for Weapons

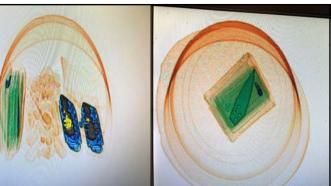
- All persons entering the court facilities should be subject to security screening
- Post list of restricted items
- Protocols for seizing, storing, and disposal of confiscated items
- Policy for response to attempts to bring weapons into court

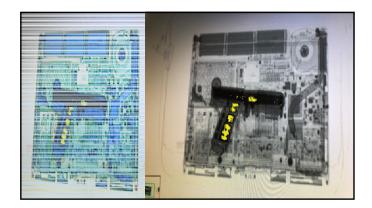
Weapons Screening Locations

- Main Entrance(s)
 - Walk Through Magnetometer
 - Hand-held Magnetometer
 - Line Scan or X ray MachineVideo Monitors

 - Duress Alarm
 - Duress Alarm Monitor
 - Appropriate Armed Staff











Duress Alarms

- Duress alarm are designed to summon immediate help
- Should be affixed (not portable)
- Placed at a various locations

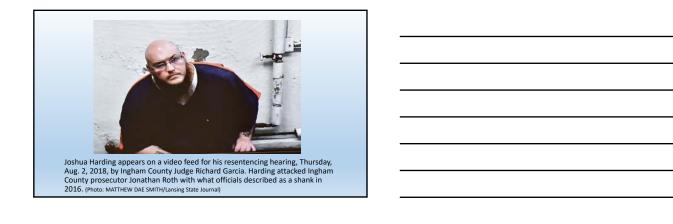

 - Conduct refresher training annually

Video Surveillance Systems

- > Monitors various locations in real time
- > Records activities in the camera range
- > Can be used for prosecution
- ➤ Alerts security to customer approaches

Court Security Electronic Access Control Card swipe system Better than key system and number code locks • Easy to limit or remove access rights Swipe card can double as Identification cards Help determine who may be left in the building during an evacuation **Court Security Secure Parking** • Separate from public parking • Underground, or fenced • Secure entrance gate • Employee entrance to building **Court Security Service Counters** • Keeps public on the public side • Limits public from removing items, files, etc. • Should have protective glass between customers and employees
