Dear Members, Partners, and Supporters:

As we look back on 2024, I am inspired by the resilience, compassion, and tireless commitment of our NCJFCJ community. This year has been a vibrant testament to the power of collaboration, innovation, and heart as we continue to pursue justice for children, families, and survivors of violence.

We began the year with momentum, building awareness about the importance of judicial education through our Days on the Hill meetings in Washington, D.C. Our delegation of board directors and judges met with elected leaders and staff to underscore the importance of judicial education in the congressional budget process. These conversations continue to elevate the voice of the judiciary and advocate for systemic improvements.

In March, over 600 juvenile and family court professionals gathered in Cleveland for the National Conference on Juvenile Justice, widely praised as one of our best yet. We proudly honored Joel and Courtney Bitonio with the Judith Horgan Award for their remarkable commitment to children and families through their work with the Greater Cleveland Food Bank and their annual “Shop with a Pro” event.

Also in March, our Immediate Past President, Judge Gayl Branum Carr, traveled to Cape Town, South Africa for the Cape Town Family Law Conference. Judge Carr represented the NCJFCJ and provided plenary remarks about the vital work of the NCJFCJ to improve the lives and outcomes of families and children seeking justice.

Another exciting development of the year has been the growth of the NCJFCJ Podcast Network, which has become a powerful new avenue for education, connection, and dialogue across the field of juvenile and family justice. What began as an innovative way to bring judicial voices to broader audiences has quickly grown into a robust platform featuring six unique podcast series, each tailored to different facets of our mission.

In July, we celebrated a major milestone with our 87th Annual Conference in Phoenix, Arizona—our largest conference since 2011, drawing over 700 participants. The program showcased cutting-edge research, practical tools, and a landmark cultural

immersion experience with the Maricopa and Pima tribal communities. We were reminded of the importance of honoring and amplifying Indigenous voices within the justice system. We also welcomed an exceptional new board of directors whose leadership will help guide our strategic direction into 2025 and beyond.

Throughout the year, we continued to strengthen partnerships and amplify our educational impact. In the fall, we were honored with the Silver and Blue Appreciation Award from the University of Nevada, Reno—our partner of more than 50 years—in recognition of our role in significantly enriching the advancement of the University and contributing to its reputation as a leading institution of higher education.

In addition, we were proud to welcome Parents Anonymous and our Australian chapter as the newest organizational members, bringing us to 14 organizational and law school partnerships and 24 active state councils. We’ve also seen a 16% increase in membership—evidence of our growing momentum and the shared belief in our mission.

This year, we proudly introduced the NCJFCJ Teddy Bear to celebrate our Season of Gratitude in the Fall.



From the classroom to the courtroom, from podcasts to conferences, and from community engagement to grassroots partnerships, 2024 has been a year of intentional growth and enduring impact. As we close this year, I remain profoundly grateful for each of you who walk with us every day in the pursuit of justice.

Thank you for your trust, your passion, and your unwavering dedication. Together, we are creating a brighter and more just future for generations to come.

In 2024, the NCJFCJ took an exciting step toward global judicial collaboration by welcoming a delegation of Australian judges into its membership as the first international chapter. This marks the first time in the NCJFCJ’s 87-year history that international judicial leaders have been formally integrated into our governance and programming.

The inclusion of judges from Australia—representing jurisdictions such as New South Wales, Victoria, and Queensland—reflects the NCJFCJ’s commitment to fostering cross-border dialogue on best practices in juvenile and family justice. These judges bring extensive experience in child protection, trauma-informed judicial practices, and family law reform.

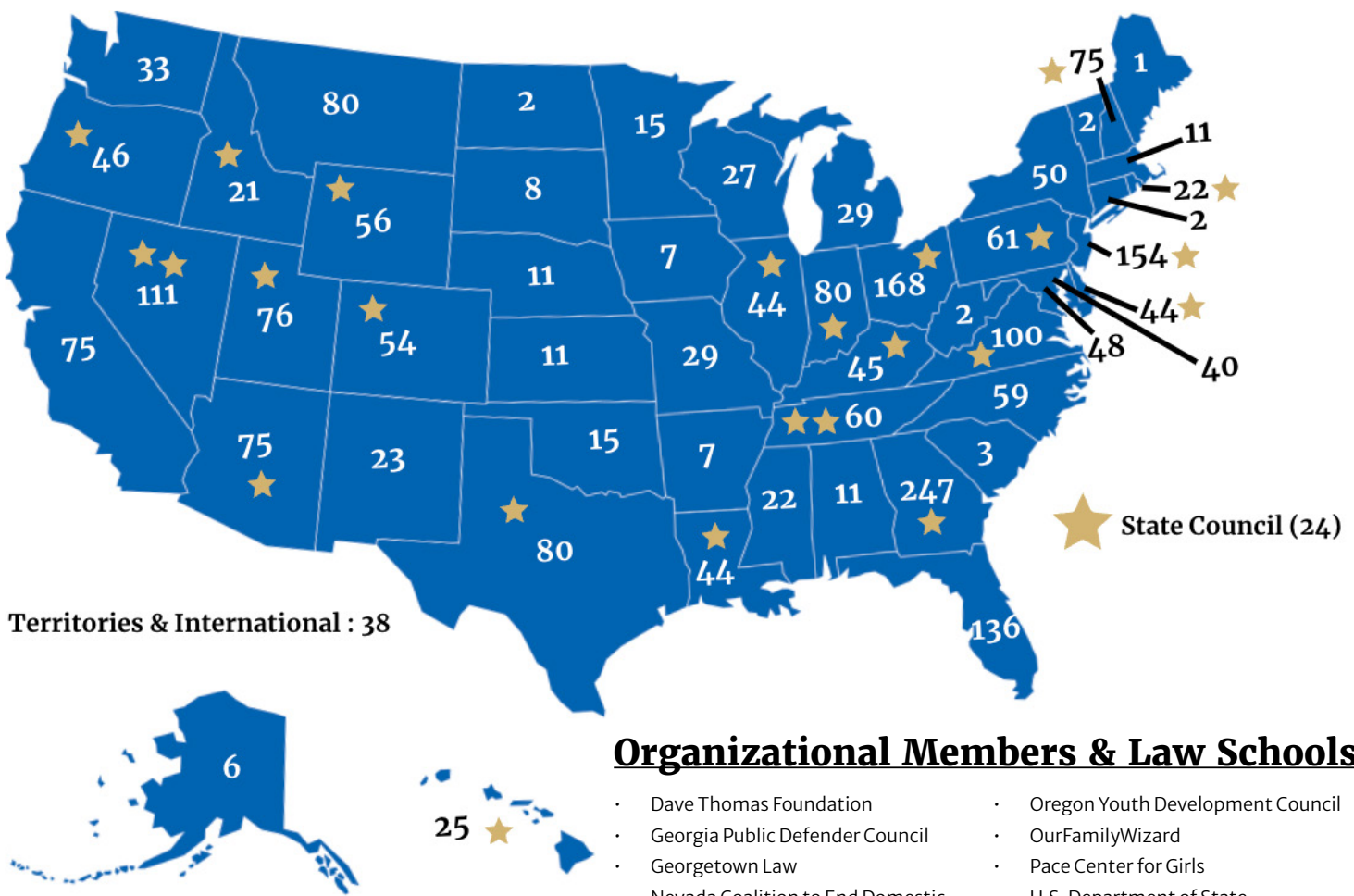

National Judicial Institute on Domestic Violence: 25th Anniversary

WHEREAS, the National Judicial Institute on Domestic Violence (NJIDV), a partnership of the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges (NCJFCJ) and Futures Without Violence (Futures), and supported by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), is committed to helping judges develop or enhance their skills in handling a wide range of criminal and civil cases involving domestic violence, teen dating violence, elder abuse, and related issues and is focused on the principles of adult education and on understanding the learning styles of judges; and

WHEREAS, the NJIDV is comprised of its foundational domestic violence course, Enhancing Judicial Skills in Domestic Violence Cases (EJS) Workshop, and its specific court assignment and special topics courses that build upon EJS, Continuing Judicial Skills in Domestic Violence Cases (CJS) Workshop; and

WHEREAS, the NJIDV furthers the NCJFCJ’s mission to provide all judges, courts, and related agencies involved with juvenile, family, and domestic violence cases with the knowledge and skills to improve the lives of the families and children who seek justice; and

WHEREAS, the NJIDV celebrates 25 years of hands-on, interactive workshops that offer information on the dynamics of domestic violence, teen dating violence, elder abuse, and related issues, as well as practical advice from experienced judges and other professionals on how to handle all aspects of these complex cases fairly and effectively; and

WHEREAS, the NJIDV is an evidence-based model found to be engaging and effective at providing information and teaching skills to judges that are applicable to their work post-training and in changing judicial behaviors in the areas of access to justice, judicial leadership, victim/survivor safety, and offender accountability; and

WHEREAS, the NJIDV is privileged to have many dedicated faculty judges and other subject matter professionals and organizations that contribute their expertise, time, and support to achieve the success of educating and training over 10,254 judges, nationally and internationally; and

WHEREAS, the NJIDV is honored to host its 25th Anniversary event in the same location the original workshop was hosted, in Spring of 1999, at the La Fonda on the Plaza in Santa Fe, NM; and

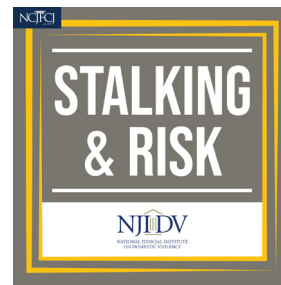

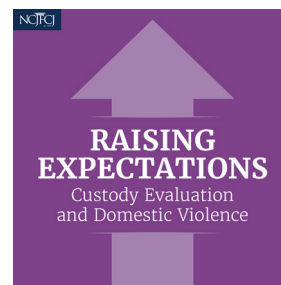

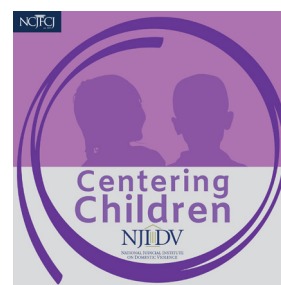
Enhanced Resource Guidelines (ERG) Podcast

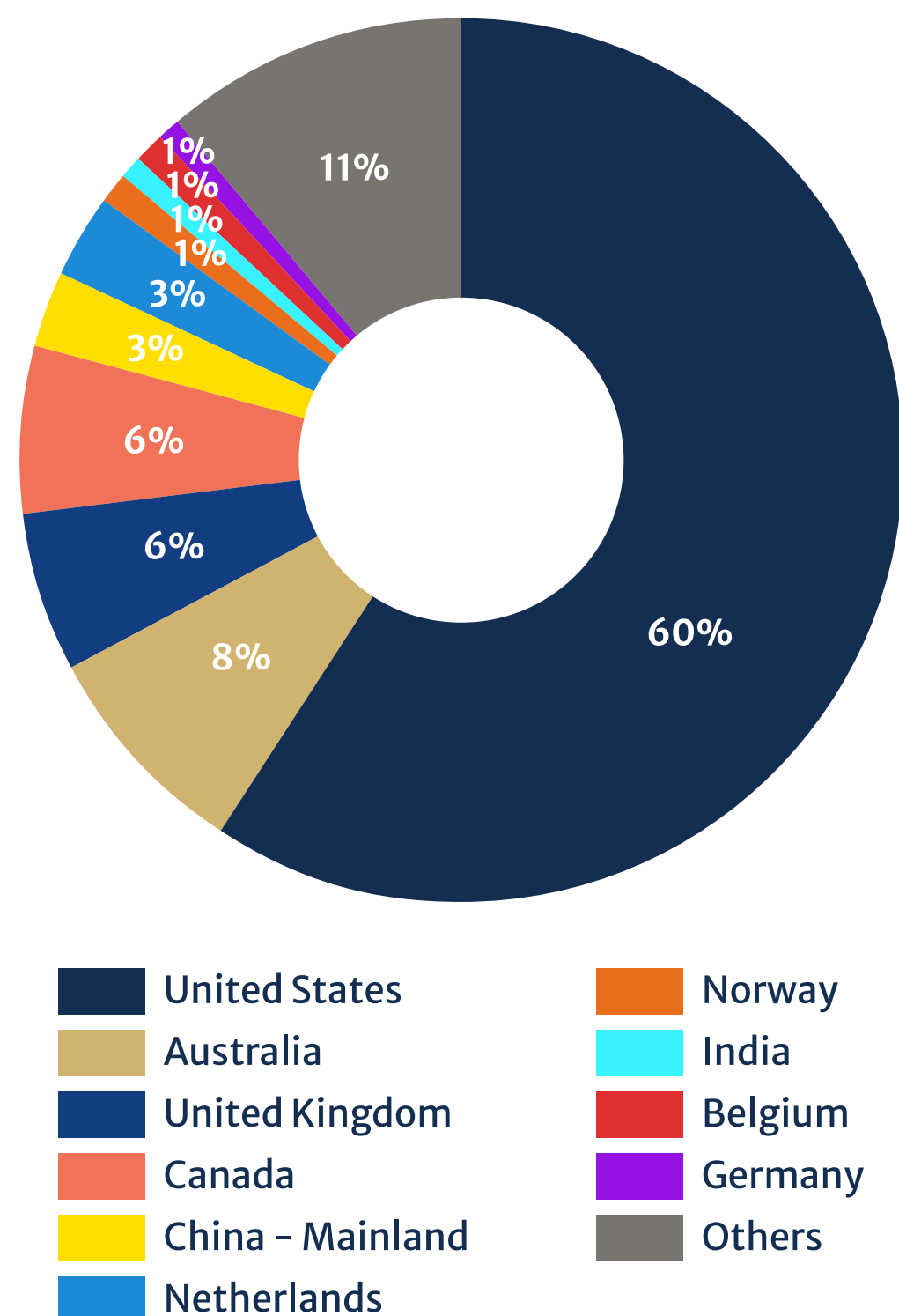


Court RENOVation

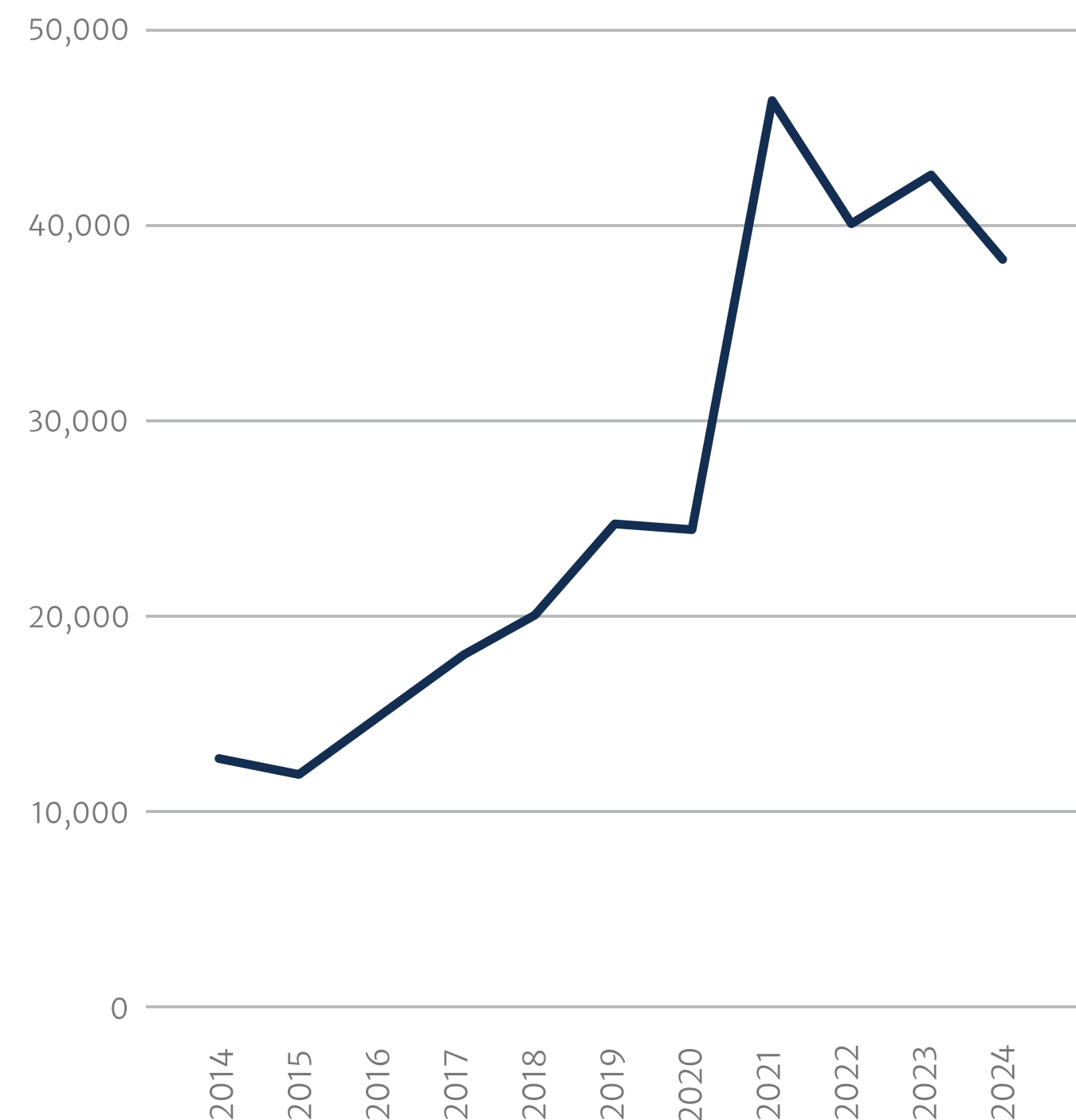
Juvenile and Family Court Journal 2024 Statistics

Top 10 Usage Countries/Regions



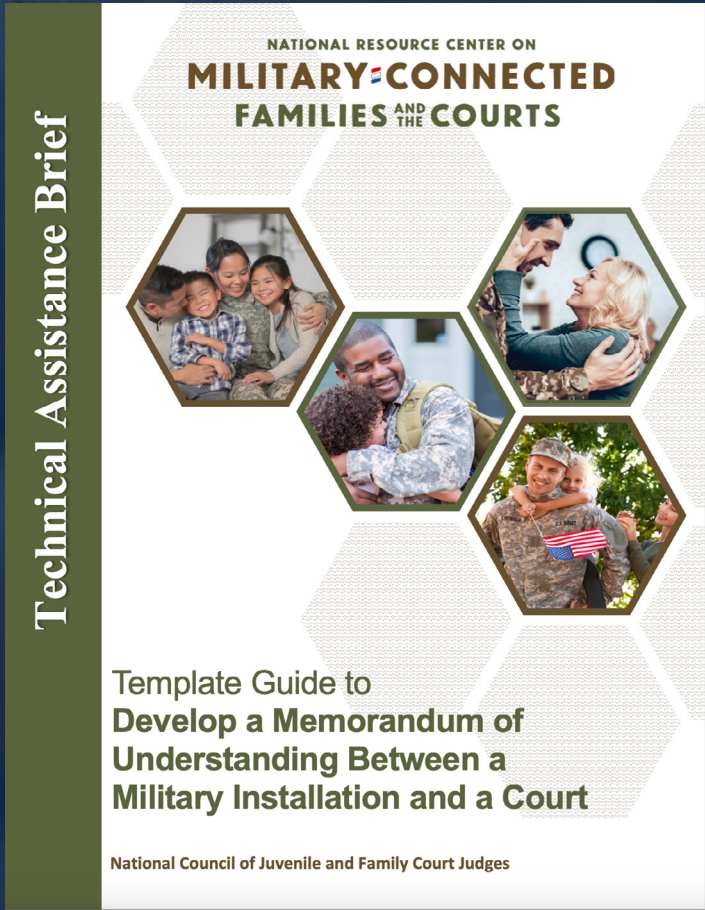

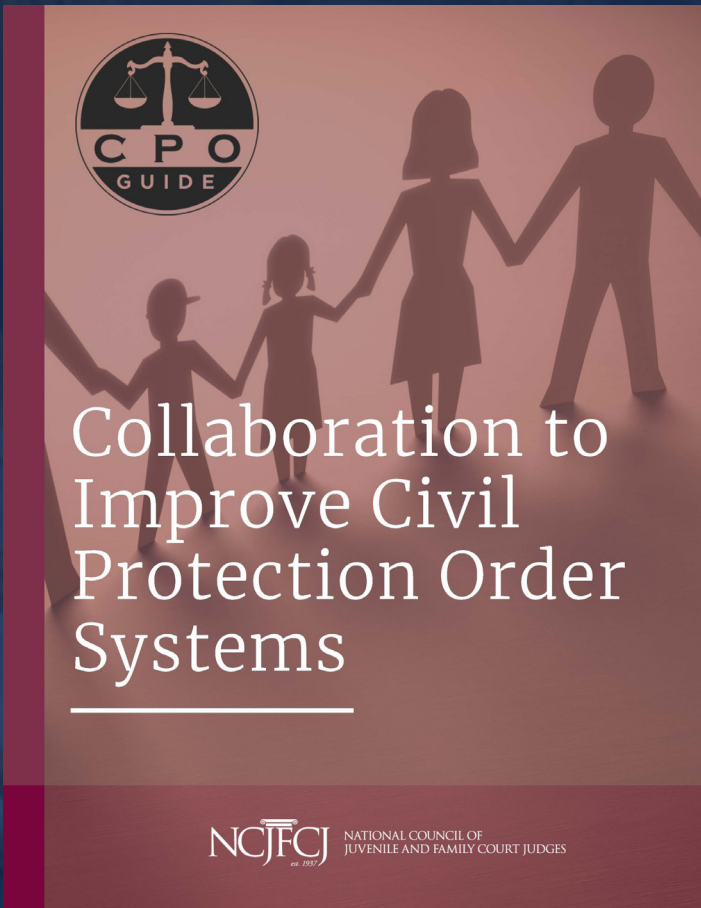
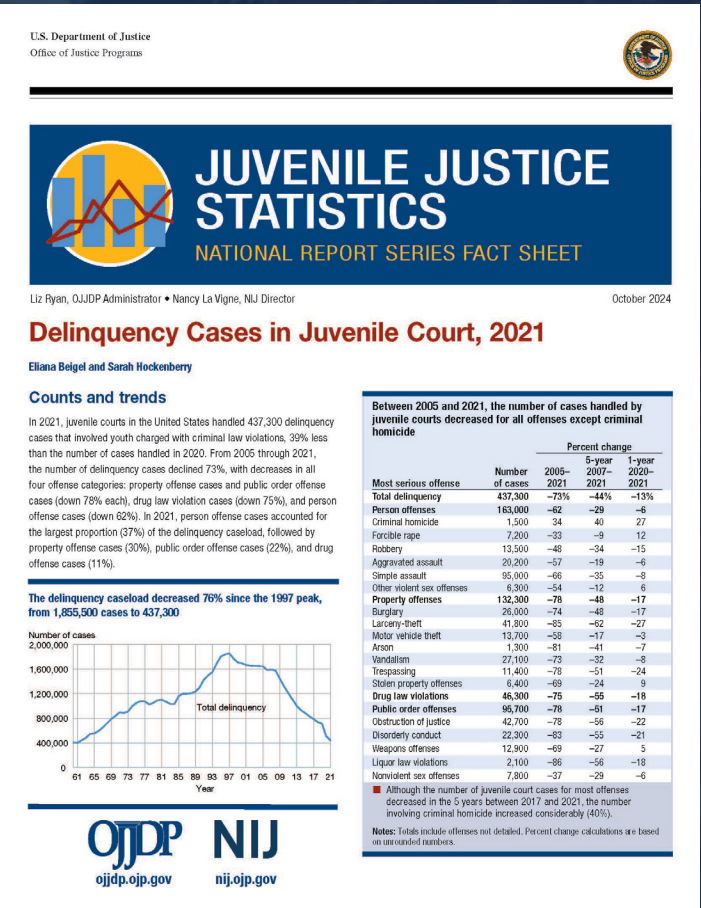
