NCJFCJ MEMBER MEETINGS AT HOME WITH YOUR MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

Dear NCJFCJ Members,

Please join your fellow NCJFCJ members in engagement with Members of Congress and during the August congressional in-district work period. As the oldest judicial training organization in the country, the NCJFCJ has provided judicial officers, courts, and court-related agencies nationwide with the education, technical assistance, and research they need to improve the lives of those who seek fair, equal, effective, and timely justice with the support of federal program funds. Reaching out while Members of Congress are home for their in-district work period helps to deepen their knowledge about the work of the NCJFCJ and the critical role juvenile and family court judges are playing to improve the outcomes for children, families, and victims of domestic violence and domestic child sex trafficking. Showcasing the work of the NCJFCJ--which includes a focus on helping children and families that appear in your courtrooms heal from trauma--is necessary to help federal policymakers understand these issues and support judicial education programs.

The August in-district work period affords a unique opportunity to invite Members of Congress and their staff to observe your court. This first-hand experience helps them (many of whom have never been in court) understand the highly complex issues that come before you. If attending your court is not feasible, a meeting with the Member of Congress while they are home in August holds tremendous value in creating trusted relationships and establishing yourself as a valued expert on the range of issues that come before your court. The goal is to position yourself and the NCJFCJ as a resource.

Finally, outreach and engagement are never limited to Members of Congress - creating trusted relationships with your state and local elected officials and their staff is likewise valuable in securing support for judicial education and advancing the field. Likewise, engagement is not limited to August. If your Members of Congress will be in the district/state at a different, more convenient time to meet, that is always welcomed too.

How to contact your Members of Congress:

U.S. Senate – visit <https://www.senate.gov/> and select Contact under the Senators menu. You will find your Senators' local office contact information via their webpages. When you call, ask for the email address of the State Scheduler so you can email an invitation for the Senator to visit your court or meet with you while in the state.

House of Representatives – visit <https://www.house.gov/representatives> to look up your Representative's local office contact information. When you call, ask for the email address of the District Scheduler so you can email an invitation for the Member of Congress to visit your court or meet with you while in the district.

Timing of requests with Members of Congress

Please conduct your outreach to schedulers 3-4 weeks before the requested meeting date.

Current Requests of Congress

Department of Justice competitive grant programs; FY 2027 Commerce, Justice, and Science (CJS) Appropriations Requests

Please provide \$6 million for OJJDP Child Abuse Training for Judicial Personnel (Currently funded at \$4.5 million); there is no other existing federally supported grant program available that provides specialized training and needed resources to juvenile and family courts. This discretionary grant program supports training, technical assistance, and research for courts which help to improve outcomes for child abuse and neglect victims, dual-status youth, victims of domestic child sex trafficking, and dependency court system reform.

Please provide \$25 million for OVW Grants to Support Families in the Justice System (currently funded at \$21 million); combines Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Court Training and Improvement and Safe Havens: Supervised Visitation and Safe Exchange programs and helps judges address the broad range of concerns that may present in family violence and child abuse cases while improving the court's response to all aspects of the civil and criminal justice system on behalf of families impacted by these crimes.

These grant programs serve as a critical backbone to our nation's response to family violence and child welfare matters. In 2025, the NCJFCJ fulfilled over 400 requests for technical assistance and trained over 10,000 judges, judicial officers, attorneys, and other juvenile and family court-related professionals across the nation, impacting over 4 million children and families. Ongoing judicial education is vital to accurate and appropriate interpretation of the law. Increased funding will support the ability of judges to prevent, identify, and address child abuse

and family violence and support the NCJFCJ's work to ensure a well-informed judiciary that protects at-risk children and families and implements laws the way Congress intended.

AUTHORIZATION REQUESTS:

Two bipartisan bills endorsed by the NCJFCJ are being considered in Congress:

[S. 2248](#), the *Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Reauthorization Act (JJDPRA)* was introduced by Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Chuck Grassley (R-IA) and Senator Sheldon Whitehouse. It reauthorizes the federal juvenile justice law through 2030 and adds additional training of personnel and screening of youth at risk of trafficking. **Offer to be a resource to Hill offices on these issues given your first-hand knowledge of the cases that come before the bench.** For juvenile justice issues, you can highlight [NCJFCJ's 50-state study](#), with an emphasis on the states identified as key models for scaling. You can remind them that [NCJFCJ supports the elimination of the Valid Court Order](#).

Countering Threats and Attacks on Our Judges Act

[H.R. 4602](#) and its Senate companion bill [S. 2379](#), the *Countering Threats and Attacks on our Judges Act*, was introduced by Representatives Michael McCaul (R-TX) and Lucy McBath (D-GA), and Senators John Cornyn (R-TX) and Chris Coons (D-DE). The bill would establish a State Judicial Threat Intelligence and Resource Center to provide technical assistance, training, and threat monitoring for state and local judges and court personnel. Given the rise in threats and violence to judges and judicial personnel, this legislation is vitally important to protect the judiciary. The NCJFCJ's request is for additional Members of Congress to cosponsor this legislation.
